New bus service opens

Student-run group offers service to Chicago suburbs

A new student-run bus service to the Chicago suburbs opens today as an alternative to Suburban Express.

"Suburban Express has been getting a lot of complaints, so I figured (students) needed another choice," said Mark Deen, junior in LAS and president of Sixth Wave Tours.

Sixth Wave Tours is run by four students three juniors and one senior who will offer service to Woodfield and Oak-

brook Malls. They hope to expand in the future.

The group has three buses that will leave for Chicago on Fridays and return on Sundays, beginning Labor Day-weekend.

A round-trip ticket costs \$30 and a one-way ticket costs \$18. Deen said these prices were cheaper than Suburban Express, but with special discounts, Suburban Express could be slightly cheaper.

"I'll be interested to see how they'll be able to compete," said Andrew Hammill, Illinois Student Government president.

Hammill said he thinks starting a new bûs service is a great idea since Suburban Express apparently is not providing the quality of service students want.

The founder of Suburban Express, Dennis Toeppen, also began his bus service as a student at the University in 1983 because he was dissatisfied with the bussing options then.

Deen said he thought it was ironic that he is starting his service the same way Toeppen did.
